WELCOME TO GRETA PUBLIC SCHOOL

Greta Public School is part of the Maitland network of schools in the Hunter Region.

Our school is well equipped and offers full educational facilities from Kindergarten to Year 6. We are part of the Rutherford Learning Community, encompassing Rutherford Technology High School, Greta Public School, Branxton Public School, Lochinvar Public School, Rutherford Public School and Telarah Public School.

This booklet has been compiled to provide you with information about the school and to answer some of the questions which may arise from time to time.

Greta Public School provides a rigorous curriculum, focusing on academic growth in literacy and numeracy where every student achieves their personal benchmarks. Social and emotional development is also a key focus.

Our aim is to establish, build and maintain respectful, collaborative relationships with parents/carers regarding their children's learning and wellbeing. A positive relationship between school and home promotes the best conditions for your children to learn and grow.

OUR SCHOOL

History

Greta Public School was established on this site in 1878 with the permanent brick building being erected. After many years operating with semi-permanent buildings the block of four classrooms was opened in 2001. Our school hall was completed in April 2010.

Facilities

Greta Public is a picturesque primary school located in a semi-rural environment within the Cessnock Shire of the Hunter Valley and is set in a pleasant environment with spacious grounds. The physical layout of the school is such that children have ample room at all times. The school has a hall and two outdoor shelters which are used for fortnightly assemblies and for visiting cultural performances which are held at the school on a regular basis. Greta Public School has a large, well equipped library which can be used for a range of activities. All students have access to the internet through a secure network. Classrooms have interactive whiteboards which greatly enhances learning in the school and students have access to Connected Classroom opportunities. A mobile bank of computer note books and iPads ensure that all students can access technology on a regular basis and enables the ongoing development of research and presentation skills. Classrooms are carpeted, well lit, have fans and are air-conditioned.

The playground has a basketball court an oval area and two covered play areas. One of these areas has an extensive range of play equipment. There is also a sand pit which is very popular with our younger students. Another feature of our playground is the school vegetable garden tended by a number of enthusiastic young gardeners.

OUR ACHIEVEMENTS

Arts

Creative and Practical Arts continue to be a focus area with students actively participating in programs both sourced externally and internally, using the expertise of teaching staff. Greta Public School has participated in a range of external performances such as Star Struck and the Hunter Dance Festival, with our students being commended on both their performance and their behaviour. Choir is also offered to students on a weekly basis.

Our students have access to visiting authors and illustrators, providing opportunities to extend different talents in our children.

Sport

Sport plays a significant role in the development of our children. Our students enjoy the various interactions that competition brings. In past years a number of our students have reached regional level in their chosen sport. Close links with our feeder high school, Rutherford Technology High School, provides students the chance to participate in Targeted Sports Programs and Gala Days.

Academic

We offer our students the opportunity to participate in a number of academic pursuits throughout the year. Some of these include the Newcastle Permanent Maths Competition, ICAS (International Competitions and Assessments for Schools) Testing, writing competitions and GATs open days at Rutherford Technology High. We continue to encourage high expectations and excellence from our students and staff.

BEHAVIOUR CODE FOR STUDENTS

NSW public schools are committed to providing safe, supportive and responsive learning environments for everyone. We teach and model the behaviours we value in our students.

Students are expected to:

- Respect other students, their teachers and school staff and community members
- Follow school and class rules and follow the directions of their teachers
- Strive for the highest standards in learning
- Respect all members of the school community and show courtesy to all students, teachers and community members
- Resolve conflict respectfully, calmly and fairly
- Comply with the school's uniform policy or dress code
- Attend school every day (unless legally excused)
- Respect all property
- Not be violent or bring weapons, illegal drugs, alcohol or tobacco into our schools
- Not bully, harass, intimidate or discriminate against anyone in our schools

Schools take strong action in response to behaviour that is detrimental to self or others or to the achievement of high quality teaching and learning.

RULES FOR STUDENTS

Our school has adopted the Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) program to support student well-being.

Expectations are explicitly taught to our students. These expectations are **Respect**, **Responsibility and Personal Best**.

We expect children to be <u>respectful</u> by:

- Cooperating
- Valuing people and property
- Showing courtesy and manners

We expect children to be <u>responsible</u> by:

- Being ready to learn
- Owning our own actions
- Caring for self and others

We expect children to do their <u>personal best</u> by:

- Focusing on tasks
- Having a go
- Aiming higher

ANAPHYLAXIS

It is important that parents notify the school if their child has an allergy and is at risk of anaphylaxis. This notification should occur either at the time of enrolment, or if the student is already enrolled, as soon after diagnosis as possible. So that the support provided by the school is effective, it is important that a partnership is established between the parent and the school to share information and clarify expectations.

ASSEMBLIES

Whole school assemblies are held fortnightly on Fridays from 9.00am. Of course, COVID-19 restrictions have meant that this is not possible at this point of time.

The school communicates via the newsletter which classes are presenting an item at assembly, with plenty of notice. Parents and community members are most welcome to attend our whole school assemblies and support their children.

ASTHMA

All children at Greta Public School who are known to have asthma are supported through asthma friendly policies and procedures. All children, staff and visitors can access Asthma First Aid in an emergency.

Parents/Carers must:

- provide an Asthma Care Plan, signed by the treating doctor
- provide their child's medication, clearly dated and in the original labelled container. A spacer and a mask must be supplied.
- alert office staff to any changes in their child's asthma.

Please note: An up-to-date Asthma Care Plan must be provided before a child can be included on either a day or overnight excursion.

ATTENDANCE

Attendance at school is a legal requirement. All students should attend Greta Public School from 9:00am to 3:00pm every day the school is open unless they have a valid reason. Valid reasons are usually sickness or medical appointments. All student absences <u>must</u> be explained. This can be done with a note, coming to the school and giving a verbal explanation, phoning the school or through the School App. This must be done within 7 days. If no explanation is provided, then an unexplained absence is automatically recorded. If your child is late to school, or leaves early they are marked with a partial absence. These also must be explained. Please ensure you sign your child in or out at the office. All attendance is monitored by the Attendance Support Officer. We are required to send requests for explanations when there are a number of unexplained absences, including partial absences. When there are ongoing problems with attendance, the Department of Education may take legal action against the parents.

BUS TRAVEL

Two bus routes operate in Greta.

Parents need to notify staff about which days their child will be catching the bus to and from school. Staff should be informed in writing to any changes to an individual's routine. Please inquire at the Office for bus pass eligibility. Opal Cards for bus travel must be applied for online at transportnsw.info/school-students.

Student bus lists are checked daily. Students travelling home by bus of an afternoon are dismissed from classes to line up in bus lines at the COLA under the supervision of staff.

CHANGE OF PERSONAL DETAILS

It would be appreciated if parents could notify the school office and classroom teacher of any **change of personal details**, e.g. address, home or mobile phone number, change of emergency contact, and of any change in your child's medical conditions / allergies that we should know.

CLOTHING POOL

A small clothing pool run by P&C operates out of the canteen. Items of school uniform can be purchased for minimal amounts of money. These items are clean and in good condition.

Greta Public School has a Uniform Shop based in the school canteen where new uniforms, hats, sports uniforms and jumpers may be purchased.

Orders are placed and paid for online using the Qkr! App.

CUSTODY OF CHILDREN

Where there are special court provisions relating to the custody of children, a copy of the arrangements must be given to the principal. If these arrangements change, it is vital that documentation is provided to the school as soon as possible.

ENROLMENT

Children are eligible to be enrolled in Kindergarten provided their 5th birthday occurs before 31st July in that year. Children seeking enrolment in any grade must live within the schools zoning area.

Each child needs to present the following to enrol:-

- Proof of age (birth certificate)
- Immunisation History Statement
- Evidence of Residential Address (rates notice, lease agreement, electricity bill)

It is a legal requirement by the Department of Education that we have the above information before your child is enrolled at school, or in the case of Immunisation Certificate as soon as the child has had their final injection.

EXCURSIONS

Throughout the year, excursions will be arranged for pupils of various classes. These may be for sporting activities or as part of the schools' programs. In all cases, they will be thoroughly planned and must have the approval of the Principal. Our K-4 classes generally undertake one or two single-day excursions. Students in Stage 3 may participate in overnight excursions supporting themes of study within the classes.

EXCURSION/ACTIVITY NOTE POLICY

All excursion/activity notes have a date of when it is to be returned and any accompanying money. Unfortunately, we do not accept notes after this due date. If for some reason you require additional time to pay, please contact the school for assistance. We ask for your cooperation to make this procedure work and to avoid the disappointment of your child missing out on activities.

GUIDANCE FOR PARENTS

Parents should not hesitate to contact the school to seek guidance about their children's progress. Teachers are always willing to discuss matters affecting children as it is felt these discussions are of benefit to pupils, teachers and parents. Appointments can be made by contacting the office. Please respect the private lives of our teachers and contact them during school hours to make an appointment about school matters. Our school counsellor currently visits our school each Monday. The services of the school counsellor are available to parents and interviews may be arranged through the principal.

HOMEWORK

Kindergarten-Year 2 - In general, students are not expected to complete formal homework in Kindergarten. Students may be given books to read at home, sight words and numbers to learn, as appropriate. In Years 1 and 2 some formal homework may be set. For example, students might be asked to read and write, learn words for spelling and complete some mathematical activities.

Years 3-6 - Homework in Years 3-6 may be varied and students may be expected to work more independently. Students could be encouraged to read and practise mathematical concepts learnt at school. Other homework may also be set across different areas of the curriculum.

HOME/SCHOOL COMMUNICATION

Effective communication between school and home builds strong, trusting partnerships. There are both formal and informal ways we will communicate with you.

Formal

- **Interviews** Parent 3-Way Parent/Student/Teacher interviews will be held in Term 2. Interviews will serve as an exchange of information between the teacher and the parent/carer and student, as well as open discussion about how their child has settled into their new class.
- **Reports** Children will receive written academic reports at the end of Terms 2 and 4. If you have any questions about this report, please make an appointment to see your child's teacher.
- **Newsletter** The school newsletter is published fortnightly. Newsletters are also published on the school website and school Facebook page.
- Notes These will be sent home when activities are organised.

Informal

- **Special Events** Throughout the year there are many occasions on which parents are invited to share special events with their children e.g. carnivals, concerts and special days. These occasions provide opportunities for friendly chats between teachers and parents which fosters positive relationships.
- School App We have a Greta Public School App that is accessible through the App Store on your smart device. The App has many capabilities such as accessing the newsletter, sending in absence advice and viewing our calendar. The main use we have for our App is to send out up to the minute information if necessary. This may include time of arrival of buses returning from excursions, unforseen changes to school arrangements and meeting reminders. The app is called Skool Loop and can be downloaded from the Google Play or Apple App Store.

AUSTRALIAN IMMUNISATION REGISTER (AIR)

An AIR Immunisation History Statement or AIR Immunisation History Form is required from all new enrolments. Children can be vaccinated at any immunisation clinic or your family G.P. and statements will be issued by NSW Health in readiness for school. You can request an Immunisation History Statement at Medicare.

Free clinics are available for immunisation in the Hunter area. For more information on locations and times visit the Hunter New England Free Immunisation Clinic website.

Children who are not immunised will be excluded from school if any child is diagnosed with a communicable disease, to help prevent those children from contracting that disease.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES

From time to time schools are subjected to outbreaks of infectious diseases. If we have medically confirmed cases of such diseases you will be notified. If your child is affected with an infectious disease, please seek medical attention, adhere to the exclusion period given to you by your doctor and contact the school.

LOST PROPERTY

It is vital that all items of clothing are labelled with your child's name. This also applies to items such as lunch boxes, school bags and pencil cases. While every effort will be made to locate owners of lost property, the school cannot be responsible for any item lost.

LUNCH ORDERS

Our school canteen, affectionately known as the 'Snack Shack', currently operates from Wednesday to Friday each week during lunch and recess times in Terms 1 and 4 and only during lunch time Terms 2 & 3. It is working towards implementing the *Healthy School Canteen Strategy* which focuses on improving student access to healthy food and drink choices which ultimately positively influence students' health and wellbeing.

Children may order lunches at school through the canteen, on the days it's in operation. Menus and price lists are updated regularly and communicated to the community. Children can place their orders before school, in the canteen, between 8.30am - 9.00am.

The canteen relies on volunteers to operate successfully and parents/carers are encouraged to assist if possible.

MEDICATION

Only medication prescribed by a doctor can be administered by staff at school. All medication that has to be administered to children during the school day must be administered by parents or a designated member of staff. Children cannot have medication in their bags or on their person. Medication slips are available from the office. You will need to provide information on dosage amount, administration time and prescription details from the prescribing doctor.

MEDICAL EMERGENCIES

Although every precaution is taken, accidents can still occur at school. In the event of a serious accident happening to your child, every effort will be made to contact you as soon as possible. Should we be unable to contact you or the alternative emergency contact, the Principal will decide whether an ambulance is to be called. Your advice on treatment for your child will be sought wherever practicable, but in cases of emergency the interests of your child will be our prime concern. We have ambulance cover for students.

MEDICAL CONDITIONS

If your child has a diagnosed medical condition, please inform the Principal so all staff can be made aware of your child's circumstances and needs. A Health Care Plan is required for long term medical conditions such as diabetes, anaphylaxis, epilepsy, asthma and other serious medical conditions.

MOBILE PHONE POLICY

Children <u>must not</u> bring mobile phones to school. If it is absolutely necessary for a child to have a phone at school it must be left at the office during school hours. Parents can leave messages for their children at the office.

PARENTAL ASSISTANCE

From time to time throughout the year, parents/carers are asked to assist teachers in various ways. We greatly appreciates the support we receive from our community. Parent helpers and

volunteers are required to complete a Working With Children declaration and 100 points ID check before assisting in classrooms or at school.

PARENTS & CITIZENS' ASSOCIATION

Our school P&C is a valued and active asset to our school. The Parents & Citizens' Association hold their meetings at school on the third Monday of each month at 4pm.

All parents are welcome to be part of this organisation. The meetings are forums for parent/teacher exchange of information and depend on an active interest being shown by all families. The group also has a fundraising function within the school. Yearly membership to Parents & Citizens' Association is \$1.00 per family.

Every Kindergarten student receives a free school bucket hat on their first day from the P&C.

PARENT ONLINE PAYMENT (POP)

For your convenience we have a POP facility to allow you to make payments online via our school website. This is a secure payment page hosted by Westpac. When making a payment online certain information is required. This information will be located on notes that are sent home. Please ensure that you adhere to the pop payment cut-off date on the note to allow for information from the bank to flow through to us.

REWARD SYSTEM

Merit certificates are awarded to children in each class to celebrate achievements within all Key Learning Areas. These certificates are presented at fortnightly whole school assemblies. Infants (K-2) classes are awarded with two academic achievement awards and two Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL) awards that focus on congratulating students for their efforts in demonstrating respect, responsibility and personal best across a variety of school settings. Primary (3-6) classes receive the same awards as Infants, however they are awarded with three academic and two PBL awards each assembly. As a school, we also acknowledge students who have 100% attendance each term, and they are presented with a certificate of congratulations for outstanding attendance.

To encourage positive behaviours at a whole school level, students have the opportunity to earn 'Greta Geckos' in both classroom and playground settings. Once the student is rewarded with a Gecko for demonstrating their ability to understand the focus of the week, it is added to a whole school or classroom tub, resulting in whole class or whole school rewards that every student has the opportunity to participate in.

To promote the development to social skills, students are invited to complete a PBL contract that focuses on the development of personal and social capabilities. The student is explicitly taught the skills within the contract and has the opportunity to practise them. Once a variety of teachers sign the contract to acknowledge the student's social capability, the student is rewarded with a PBL Achievement badge. As the students' social capabilities develop, they are offered a continuum of contracts so that students' can earn tokens that hang from their badge. The tokens spell out the word GECKOS.

RIDING BIKES TO SCHOOL

The Roads and Maritime Services Department recommends that children be at least 10 years old to ride a bike on the road. This is because children's peripheral vision, the capacity to see and take in what they see outside their central gaze, doesn't fully develop until around the age of 10. By law students up to the age of 12 are also able to ride on the footpath. Students riding a bike to school must wear an approved helmet and must walk their bike from the concrete paths outside the school grounds to and from the bike racks. Scooters are **not allowed** on school grounds.

SCHOOL HOURS

Normal school hours are from 9:00am – 3:00pm, with a lunch break from 11.00 - 11.30am and recess from 1:30 - 2:00pm.

The school playground is not supervised prior to 8.40am so children **should not** arrive at school before that time.

SCHOOL SPORT HOUSES

The school has four sport houses, named after local landmarks: Anvil (purple), Hunter (green), Morgan (blue) and Whitburn (yellow).

SCHOOL DRESS CODE

Our school community believes that a school uniform provides a sense of belonging and fosters pride in the school. The school uniform is set by the P&C Association in consultation with the whole school community.

For safety, children who have pierced ears **must** only wear studs or sleepers. The wearing of necklaces, bracelets, bright hair colours, makeup or nail polish is also discouraged.

SPORT

Sporting activities of various kinds are arranged throughout the year. While every effort is made to develop the skills and talents of individual children, it is the policy of the school to encourage participation by all children. Opportunities are available for children in primary classes to compete at district, regional and state levels through P.S.S.A. trials and carnivals. Attempts are made to expose children to as many different sports as possible.

STUDENT TRANSITION

Greta Public School works closely with the local pre-school to ensure a happy and safe start for our new Kindergarten students. We provide a sequence of programmed visits to our school for each pre-school child who is intending to enrol in our school for their first year of primary school. These visits take place in Terms 3 and 4.

We are part of the Rutherford Learning Community, a community of primary schools that partners with Rutherford Technology High School. The high school offers a caring, supportive and challenging learning environment. In partnership with them we plan the transition of students to the secondary setting, ensuring that our students are prepared to participate in a wide range of academic, sporting, cultural and social activities.

WHAT YOUR CHILDREN LEARN AT SCHOOL

There are six key learning areas in the primary curriculum:

English	Human Society and Its Environment
Mathematics	Creative Arts
Science and Technology	Health, Physical Education and Personal Development
